Regardless of this individual Fishbowl speaker, I still believe Fishbowl is beneficial to CLP students. Not only does it allow us to hear from a diverse set of leaders throughout our community, but it brings all four years of CLP peers together in one room, even though this year

it was held virtually. Hearing from Fishbowl speakers is a great opportunity to reflect on my own style of leadership and where I aim to be in the future. I think it is also very beneficial to hear from people of such diverse careers. Hearing from somebody in the tech sector, housing division, investment organizations, etc. provides very different viewpoints that we can benefit from. It would be interesting if some of our Fishbowl speakers could talk about aspects we are currently learning in our classes, such as "The Box" and thinking surrounding it. While they may not have read the same books we have, I would like to hear their interpretation of the meaning behind the phrase and how they utilize that in their leadership roles.

Although Regina did not put a good impression on me, I am grateful for the time she took out of her day to engage with us in meaningful discussion.
